- Modern Kitchen/ Diner on our middle floor, for use in isolation or conjunction with community rooms.
- Business suite with 8 hot desks on the top floor.

- Fully refurbished community rooms with modern Audio/ Visual facilities.

- Modernised shop front.

These changes are a direct result of what you have asked for. In the summer of 2015 we ran a vision group with representatives of all of the Churches in our local area. We encouraged them all to pray into and bring ideas about how the space at LivingStones could best be used by the Christian community in Fleet.

The results from this vision team were captured in an online survey. The Christians in Fleet then voted for what you wanted to happen. We have listened and the new LivingStones Christian Centre provides facilities and resources for everything you told us you wanted. In particular facilities to support :-

- Drop-in and Talk Space
- Children's Story Time
- A Hot-Desk Office Suite
- Youth Café
- Multi-Configuration Community Room with Multimedia Audio System
- Potential for a Town Centre Chaplaincy

The refurbishment starts at the beginning of January. The shop is anticipated to be closed for 5 weeks but we will be operating a telephone-based service for orders, during this period.

There is a meeting on December 5th at Church on the Heath at which the directors and management will show what the new building and facilities will look like. It will also highlight the arrangements that we will be following during the redevelopment period.

LivingStones Quenches Fleet's Festive Thirst

At the Fleet Food Festival this year LivingStones served up 300 cups of Traidcraft tea, Karuna coffee and squash to a steady stream of visitors and fellow stall holders. We kept freshly brewed coffee flowing from 8am until 4pm with the help of a wonderful team of volunteers.

The Fleet Food Festival is a community-focussed event occurring annually at the Views in Fleet. In 2016 there were over 7,000 visitors but there were insufficient



hot drink outlets resulting in queues of over 40 minutes. Therefore, after our success of providing 500 cups of tea and coffee at the 2016 Fleet Christmas Festivities, the organisers invited LivingStones to serve at the 2017 Festival.

We will also be holding stock that you can pick up there and then. Or why not drop in to LivingStones and stay awhile enjoying a Karuna Coffee.

Current coffee blends available from Karuna are Brazilian, Colombian, Guatemalan, Honduran, Kenyan, Malawian, Peruvian, Rwandan as well as decaffeinated.





Day 11 - Born as the true man

"And being found in appearance as a man..."

Philipians 2 v 8

There may well be moments this Christmas when you feel as if no one understands. "The turkey is overcooked," someone says—without appreciating all the hard work you've put into preparing the meal. "I would have preferred it in blue," someone murmurs—without appreciating all the hours you spent struggling through the crowds of Christmas shoppers. "Having the house full of visitors drives me crazy," someone complains—but you'll be spending Christmas day on your own, grieving a relationship that was or a relationship that might have been.

"No one appreciates me; no one understands," we think. But this verse tells us that isn't true.

Jesus was "found in appearance as a man," says verse 8. At a time when many people doubted Christ's humanity, Paul's point was that Jesus was recognised to be a man.

Consider what Luke says about the childhood of Jesus: "Jesus grew in wisdom and stature, and in favour with God and man" (Luke 2 v 52). Although the divine nature of Jesus continued to be all-knowing, in some mysterious way his human nature gained wisdom.

And Jesus grew in size. Perhaps Joseph and Mary measured the growth of their children with notches on the doorpost. There's one mark labelled "Jesus, aged 5". Then a few inches up, "Jesus, aged 8". Growing limbs and muscles is a hard trick to pull off if you're only pretending to be human!

When his family hear what Jesus is saying and doing in Mark 3 v20-21, they assume he's gone crazy. And that's not the conclusion you come to if you think someone was never truly human. For 30 years Jesus had eaten with them, worked with them, played with them, slept with them, joked with them. As a result, although his family had doubts about whether he was the Messiah, they never doubted he was human.

Jesus knows what it's like to be human because he was human and still is human—as human as you are. The only difference is that now his humanity is enlarged by his glory. Now by the Spirit he can sympathise with every one of us everywhere. And that means we can "approach God's throne of grace with confidence" (Hebrews 4 v 16). When it feels as if no one else understands us, we can come to one who truly does. When we feel alone in our weariness and weakness, we can come to God's throne of grace in prayer. When our hearts ache for what we have lost, we can bring that emotion to the one who has felt it too.

Books for Life with Pete Greig

In the Books for Life interviews, leading Christians talk about books that have had a strong influence on their Christian life.




Pete Greig is the founder of the 24/7 prayer movement

“One of the most important books for me as I was starting out really in Christian leadership was this one by Richard Foster called *Streams of Living Water*. It’s not his best known book but I think it’s seminal because what he does is he traces all the different types of church down the ages – the liberation stream, the charismatic stream, the evangelical stream, the liturgical stream. And he shows how each one of them has an essential message, an essential contribution, to the whole that is the body of Christ.

And then what he does, and I think this is brilliant, is he says, if this tradition, this stream, doesn’t interface with the other streams this is where it goes wrong, evangelicalism becomes pharisaism, the liberation stream just becomes dead religion – social justice without any personal salvation and so on. And so this is a brilliant summary of why as Christians we need to celebrate our differences, work together and enjoy the diversity of the church rather than feeling we’ve got to apologise for it.

So this was incredibly important in setting the DNA as 24-7 was beginning. We’re working with everyone from the Salvation Army to the Catholics right around the world. And as I go and interact with other Christians more and more I try to think not what’s wrong with them but what’s right with them, what can I learn from them. This book taught me to do that.”

Should I Apologize for my Faith?

The obvious answer is “No”, but the right answer is “Yes”. Of course it is a trick question and if we dig a little deeper into the meaning of the English word “apologize” we find that it has a second meaning, that is, “to offer defensive argument”. Apologize comes from the Greek word *apologia* which means to reply to charges levelled against a defendant.

This Greek word is used in [1 Peter 3:15](#) (NIV2011): “But in your hearts revere Christ as Lord. Always be prepared to give an answer (*apologia*) to everyone who asks you to give the reason for the hope that you have. But do this with gentleness and respect.”

Therefore the defence of our faith (*apologia*) is not optional but a command to always be ready to provide a reasoned defence for what we believe. From this command has emerged the discipline of Christian Apologetics which seeks to help us to formulate answers to the questions that we will undoubtedly be asked.



Premier Christian Radio broadcasts a show called *Unbelievable* in which Justin Brierley invites leading Christian and non-Christian thinkers to discuss issues of faith. After 500 episodes of the show, Brierley has written a book reflecting on these conversations (including insights from Richard Dawkins, Philip Pullman, NT Wright and Justin Welby). Brierley explains why he still finds Christianity the most compelling answer to life, the universe and everything.

I took the opportunity of a summer holiday to read Justin’s book as well as a similar book by Tim Keller, *The Reason for God*. Both books address similar questions but approach their answers from different perspectives. Brierley’s book presents the views of leading unbelievers and contrasts these with the views of his Christian guests.

Keller’s writings are a more academic treatment (of often the same questions) and typically delve deeper and wider. I personally enjoyed Brierley’s book because it was so easy to dip into (especially while lying around a swimming pool). Keller’s book was also excellent, but I would suggest you need to study it rather than dip into it.

The study of Christian Apologetics is a wonderful faith-affirming opportunity to explore answers to your own questions as well as provide support in forming your answers to “the reasons for the hope that you have”.




The Back Page

have mercy on me, a sinner.*


